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

ell as my story goes. One 4th, sipping our coffee. Paula and I heard a band coming down Bremen Street. So we walked out and joined the crowd. It seemed like they were marching like this for years. And they were. Now people poke fun at the flags and ice cream. An old fashioned way. A patriotism wedded to imperialism. A vow to support the country and bless the flag regardless the path the country had taken.

But we forget. And we remember. This is the summer bliss for children. Celebration, games, treats-and C raker Jacks-yes we had to have that too, and fireworks at the end. That is the 4th I remember and cherish.

When we got to the park we saw that a band would be playing later in the afternoon. And we thought how cool. We came back and found a mostly empty park with kids on the stage pestering the Ommpah band. Trying to yell in the mics you about my transcendent moment during all those long 4th days as a host. The county would put up a wood stage under a noble Elm tree. The pool was still in the park. We hired bands to please those willing to join in the fun. Often the Mayor would come during the day and sing songs. We had singing mayors in days past. The last I believe was Mayor John Norquist. I got to be on stage as he was with a traveling band that played the Beatles Taxman. A couple of us sang backup vocals: "Cause I'm the Taxman, Taxman, Taxman"

By the end of the day the featured band would play. This one year. This one year. It was the Electric War Babies. Yes, a black band with a rocking style and a lead singer who wore a big smurfy blue glove. And they had a following. As the day wound down and the sun went away, just before the fireworks would hold sway. They finished up. A man next to me was a bit offended. They were "making fun," he said. They opened the stops and and played an excellent version of Jimi Hendrix's Star Spangled Banner with a crescendo of sound at the finish and final salute, the black power salute, clenched fists held in the air, as the fireworks started to pop. Whooh. Yes it was so.

Remembering George Darrow

George Darrow died at age 70 on May 30, 2023, in Milwaukee. A New Yorker by birth, and a Milwaukeean by choice, George was a proud Riverwest resident whose community shaped him as much as he shaped it, through his many creative pursuits, his care for people, his engagement, his volunteerism, and his search for common ground.

A vibrant part of the Riverwest arts

scene, George was a talented artist, musician, and poet. He was a husband and father, too, and a brother, uncle, friend, and collaborator. He was a philosopher, teacher, and mentor, and also an all-around kid at heart. Throughout Riv-

erwest, George could be found telling jokes, dispatching wisdom, distributing toys at the neighborhood block parties, and offering people the encouragement he hoped would help ignite their own artist within.

George believed every day was a good day, and lived his life in accordance with seeking out the good, the humane, the just, and sparking others to do the same. For him, each day was an opportunity to commune and be in camaraderie with people. A few years ago, as a friend recalls, George gave her a bundle of bumper stickers he had made. One sticker read, "It's a gift, that's why they call it the present" — a true slogan of his being, as he loved nothing more than being in the moment, here and now, with someone else.

Born on September 18, 1952, in Greenwich Village, New York, to Chick and Margarita Darrow, George was the third of six children — the first two, Guy and Kathy, from his father's previous relationship, and the last four, of whom he was the oldest, made up of Gregory, Gary, and Virginia. Chick was a vaudevillian, Margarita a jazz singer, and the Darrow children were raised surrounded by music, dancing, comedy, and an eclectic group of performing artists who often came around to visit. "There was never a dull moment growing up," remembers Ginny, the youngest. Sometimes, the amusement was so great that her brothers would sell tickets to their friends for admission to the fun. "We would have parties," she says," and George would usually get up and perform first."

Enamored with music from an early ge, it wasn't long before George took to banging on the family furniture, which prompted his parents to buy him a drum kit. That marked the beginning of a lifelong adventure in music, taking him from garages in Queens to popular clubs like CBGBs and Fillmore East in Manhattan's Lower East Side. After moving to Milwaukee, he performed at Summerfest, the Locust Street Festival, and beyond. In these spaces, he drummed and played other percussion instruments, sang, and strummed the guitar. George was a lyricist and composer. He was entirely self taught; he never completed college, read widely, and experimented broadly.

closure in 2002. The world of memorabilia fascinated George, and would reappear later in his life, in Milwaukee, when he reopened the once, and now again, shuttered Jackpot Gallery on Center Street. After acquiring the gallery from its original co-founders, George and his business partner Jason Royal Hart reimagined Jackpot as a hybrid space for art exhibitions, collectibles, and custom-made vintage computer and video games. "It's just fun. We're just gonna try it and see what happens," George was quoted as saying to On-Milwaukee in 2015.

What was it, though, that led George to

> Milwaukee from New York? It was love, of course. In February 1993, George met Nancy Peske, a Milwaukeean living in New York, when she and her mother, who was visiting from out of town, stopped into Darrow's Fun Antiques on their way to the subway. Needing a reprieve from the bitter cold, Nancy had told her mom, "Let's just duck in this crazy store and warm up." When they got inside, George was there. He was unlike anyone Nancy had ever met: "I have to have that person in my life," she remembers thinking at the time. "He was so full of life and philosophy and wisdom and joy, and I just thought, I have to know him."

> George and Nancy got married in 1996, and had their son Dante a few years later. In 2005, they relocated to Nancy's hometown. As a father, George was focused on ensuring his son, who was diagnosed with sensory processing disorder, could access the right input and frequency of sensory diet activities. Around Shorewood, he became known as the neighborhood stickball teacher and drumming mentor. When the family moved across the Milwaukee River, to Riverwest, George brought with him his youthful zeal, becoming a staple of this community over the years as well.

> Committed to public communication and community voices, George helped found Riverwest Radio, the local Low Power FM station that began broadcasting from Center Street in 2012. George's program "Musicology" was a weekly installment of fresh music, paired with the "ology" of philosophical discussion, political activism, book and poetry readings, and, of course, plenty of jokes. At the root of George's "ology" was the





His father's Upper East Side shop, the renowned Darrow's Fun Antiques that sold and rented collectible toys, is where George spent much of his working life, taking over the helm after Chick passed in 1984 and running it until its study of truth, of beauty, and of truth as beauty. In following his curious and critical thinking, he flitted from writing poetry to painting intense, energetic works; from singing and songwriting to instrumentation, naturalism, research, and all the liminal spaces in between. Part of George's quest for the truth was his deep inquiry into topics like the dark government and the assassination of John F. Kennedy - a topic he discussed in great detail on Musicology's annual JFK tributes with his collaborator and comrade, the poet Jeanie Dean (the same friend he'd given the gift-of-the-present bumper sticker). "You don't find that kind of camaraderie very often in life," she says. "It was very wonderful having that sense that someone's got my back on this."

George did not shy away from asking important, often tough, questions, and he

believed love is always the answer. He trusted in the power of creative expression. He cherished Mother Earth — wearing a necklace of the globe and t-shirts printed with the planet — and he strived to be her steward. He lived his life the way he wanted, and that was to live it fully, to hold onto his child within, to never be afraid to be himself, and to always advocate for a better world.

"I'm trying to raise the consciousness of the planet without being a know-it-all," George said all those years ago to OnMilwaukee. "I hope to add a little spice and a little light and a little enlightenment and fun to the world and to Milwaukee."

wo Bar (718 E Burleigh) is hosting a new event on Thursday nights called Speed Vibing. Invented by bartender Stephanie Smith (who was enthusiastically helped with the idea by her boyfriend, Paul Zimmerman), Speed Vibing is "a take on speed dating, but without the romantic context."

Meant as a fun way to meet your neighbors, Speed Vibing is set up as a "slightly structured" evening where "you show up at the bar at 8, grab a seat next to someone you don't know, and then every 10-15 minutes, we'll play musical chairs. That way you don't sit next to the same person twice. We just want it to be fun and no stress."

There will be games available (like puzzles, riddles, or dad-joke cards, etc.) to prompt conversations and break down barriers. Steph will also be DJ, playing music to set the vibe. And Paul is looking forward to seeing what doodles people come up with on the large pieces of paper covering the tables, where he's also put out tons of different colored markers to use.

Paul points out, "It seems like people perceive that you can only go to Two when you're on a date." t's easy to find El Salvador Restaurant at the corner of Lincoln Avenue and South 6th Street. After you look up and locate the dome of the Basilica of St. Josaphat, cross 6th and you will see the unimposing building that houses the restaurant. They specialize in Salvadoran and Mexican food with an emphasis on Pupusas.

The restaurant is immaculate, with its dark green diner-style chairs, a tile floor, two booths, ten tables, three TVs with the sound turned off, and the Salvadorian flag prominently displayed on the wall. It is a bright, cheerful place, with plenty of art to look at, and street-side windows that face the Basilica.

You must order Pupusas when you come to El Salvador. My companion and I split an order, since one order includes three pupusas, enough for a meal for one. This is a stuffed, handmade corn tortilla that is fried on a griddle and served with Curtido, pickled chopped cabbage that's lightly seasoned with oregano.

Our cheese pupusas reminded me of a toasted cheese sandwich with some crusty cheese on the outside. A pupusa filled with pulled pork, beans, and cheese was also delicious and when it was combined with the spicy Curtido, it was a perfect snacky treat or a light meal. You want to look out for the red peppers in the Curtido -- they will set your mouth on fire.

To complete our meal, my companion and I split an order of Pasteles, deepfried flaky pastry stuffed with chicken, a Salvadoran treat similar to an empanada.

During a prior visit, I found that the Comida Del Mar (Shrimp Sauté with Garlic served on thin slices of fried potatoes) had enough garlic to announce its presence, yet the garlic was not overwhelming, just a tasty reminder of that pungent flavor. The plate included rice with bits of corn and carrots and pureed refried pinto beans. One grilled poblano, hot and spicy, sent me to my refresco -- lemonade made with real lemons -- to put out the fire in my mouth.


For my companion's Carne Asada Con Casamiento, the chef combined the rice and beans instead of serving them as separate sides. The steak was tender and served with the added pizzazz of a cool lettuce side salad and a hot grilled poblano. (Casamiento in Spanish means wedding or marriage, implying that the beans met the rice, became one on the plate, and lived on in matrimonial harmony.) I had modest expectations for the Pollo Guisada, but was I surprised! Half a chicken cut into leg, breast, and wing had been stewed in a red sauce that hinted of allspice and cumin, then served over rice. The fork-tender meat literally slid off the bones. Each bite was impossibly tender and infused with the subtle flavors of the sauce. Pollo Guisado, a superstar on this extensive menu, will call me back to El Salvador again.

They serve it whole, head included, along with rice and a salad.

If you like your fruit cut up in a drink, order the Ensalada de Frutas or mixed fruit drink. What made this special were the floaters, perhaps as much as half a cup of chopped pineapple, mango, and apple, mixed into the naturally fruit-flavored drink. Or you can order the Lemonade, my drink of choice at El Salvador. It's huge, tart, and wonderfully refreshing.

El Salvador may be the smallest and most densely populated country in Central America, but it has a mighty fine cuisine that is on display in this small and unpretentious restaurant.





Adventuresome diners might want to order Salvadorian-style Mojarra Frita, a small fried fish much like tilapia.



Forest Home Cemetery - A Stroll Through Milwaukee's Past

ments designed to honor the deceased

walk in Forest Home Cemetery is a visit to so many ghosts of the past: early settlers who founded the city; movers and shakers who grew the city; Beer Barons who put Milwaukee's breweries on the map; 21 soldiers who lost their lives in the Civil War; and common folk who lived in Milwaukee and made it their home. As you wander among the gravesites, you will find it's quiet, peaceful, and a place where you might be encouraged to linger and contemplate life's complexities.

In these 200 acres set in the middle of the city in the Lincoln Village neighborhood, there are 2600 trees of 100 different species; cultivated flower gardens; native plants; fruit trees; spring wildflowers, and prairie grasses. It's a garden, an arboretum, and a destination for locals as well as out-of-town visitors to Milwaukee.

The land for the cemetery was selected in 1847 by a committee from St. Paul's Episcopal Church. At the time, it was two miles outside the city limits, hence the members believed it would remain a rural cemetery. The boundaries followed the recently constructed Janesville Plank Road (now W. Forest Home Ave.), far from the urban development that would eventually surround this rural acreage.

In 1850, Increase A. Lapham, a well-known early naturalist, designed the original cemetery. It has been written that Lapham (who is buried here) may have modeled it after the garden cemeteries of the Victorian era, which accounts for the curved roads that wander among the gravesites.

The first person to be buried in the new cemetery was Orville Cadwell in 1850. He was soon joined by the many victims of a cholera outbreak in the city that occurred between 1849 and 1854.

The Walk

Start your visit to the cemetery in the office, located on the grounds close to the entrance. Here you will find a brochure with a map as well as a booklet that lists many of the prominent citizens who are buried here. This is a good starting point for a random stroll, or a treasure hunt focused on seeking the locations of wellknown Milwaukeeans. A list of only some of the famous folks includes beer barons Joseph Schlitz and Frederick Pabst: the industrialists Guido Pfister and Edward Allis: mayors and founders Byron Kilbourn and George Walker; military hero General William Mitchell, and entertainers Alfred Lunt and Lynn Fontanne. You may notice a few obelisks commonly used as markers to indicate the soul has risen. They come in all sizes, from humble to majestic. In addition to the obelisks scattered around the cemetery, there are other symbolic carvings to look for. These include books that represent a heart open to God, ivy leaves that suggest friendship, and the draped urn, showing the thin veil between life and death. All these symbols and more are described in the booklet

available in the office.

You will also notice trees with silver disks attached. The numbers on the disks correspond to the names of the trees listed in the self-guided tree tour in the booklet.


Because it would be almost impossible to chart a specific course through the grounds, it makes sense to arm yourself with a map and let this be a walk of discovery. You will find serendipitous views of fountains, sculptures, gardens, funerary art, mature trees, and lovely vistas around every curve.

Savor this walk and thank the committee at St. Paul's Episcopal Church who had the foresight to set aside and preserve this formerly rural land made up of gentle hills and magnificent trees. There will always be more condos, apartments, malls, and subdivisions, as metro Milwaukee continues its march to pave the surrounding countryside, but Forest Home Cemetery and those 200 acres will forever remain an island of tranquility in the midst of the city.





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


