



Historic boat will visit Milwaukee to promote peace

The Golden Rule, a storied sailboat that helped bring about an end to atmospheric testing of nuclear weapons, will stop in Milwaukee Friday, September 1 through Monday, September 4 as part of a 15-month, 11,000-mile voyage to inform and educate the public about the dangers of nuclear weapons proliferation. available for presentations at schools, churches or other venues during the four-day visit. Boat tours and visits with the crew will be offered every afternoon.

The 35-foot wooden sailboat will be docked at Lakeshore State Park, on the downtown lakefront between Discovery World and the Summerfest grounds. It will tie up at Discovery World for the first day, Friday, Sept. 1, and be in a slip at Lakeshore State Park Sept. 2-4. Free boat visits and tours are offered 1-4pm from 2-5pm. September 4 is Labor Day, and the Milwaukee Area Labor Council is encouraging people who attend Labor Fest to visit the nearby boat.

The Golden Rule began its trip on the Great Loop route in September 2022 on the Mississippi River in Minnesota, sailing to the Gulf, and circling the south and east coasts before reaching the Great Lakes this summer. It will make more than 100 stops.

In 1958 a crew of Quakers sailed the

and interfere with atmospheric nuclear weapons tests, although that voyage was halted by the government and the crew arrested. As a result of this highly publicized mission and public outcry about the radiation blowing around the world, President Kennedy signed the Limited Nuclear Test Ban Treaty in 1963. The Golden Rule action inspired many peace makers and peace ships that followed, including Greenpeace.

Golden Rule was in private hands and sunk, but was rescued from a watery grave in 2010 and restored to her former beauty by Veterans For Peace and others who support her new mission: to promote a nuclear free future, to educate about the dangers of radiation to humanity and the environment, and to support peaceful alternatives to war. The current voyage is a project of Veterans For Peace, with its local visit sponsored by Milwaukee Veterans For Peace and a dozen other peace and justice organizations.

NEIGHBOR SPOTLIGHT: The Mighty Ms. Erica

Starting around the age of two or three, "My mom said I always just sang, sang, sang all the time, through the house," says Ms. Erica Johnson. "My dad was a record collector of the Blues. There was always Muddy Waters or KoKo Taylor going on in the house. Every day! I can just remember always loving the Blues."

She sang in a couple school productions in middle school and at the High School of the Arts and then took a long break from performing, other than to respond to an occasional request for a funeral. Around the age of twenty-six, after lots of schooling, living, loving, and a couple kids, her cousin wondered why she wasn't singing. There was an R&B band that was looking for a female vocalist. "Give it a try," he said, "if you don't like it you can just say you gave it a try."

And she did. For three months she sang with Phase Two without a real gig "doing a lot of R&B -- Whitney Houston, a lot of ballads, a lot of Anita Baker."

When the band's keyboardist told her a blues band was trying to find a female singer she thought, "Ah, that ain't really for me. I grew up on that, I don't want to sing the blues. I liked to listen to it, and I loved it, but it just wasn't what I wanted to sing."

Still, when she heard from The Bedroom Doctor and he asked her to audition, she went.

Not really knowing what they'd want to hear, she prepared to do a ballad. Instead, when she got there, he asked her to sing "Clean Up Woman," a well-known blues standard.

Before she finished the song, she was hired. Three practices a week and lots of

gigs, including for the AM1290 Christmas Party, kept her with the band until James Tatham (Foots) of the Misfits heard her singing karaoke. "Something is really distinctive about your voice!" he told her. "If I ever need a female singer, I'm gonna call you."

The opportunity came quickly. Starting with a couple weekly gigs, as well as playing blues spots all over, Erica sang all the songs she remembered from her youth, "making them (her) own." In 2010 Erica got married. Around the same time Foots decided to end the Misfits. But it was only a few months before she was putting up an ad at Cascio's, looking for a new band. Brew City Rhythm and Blues brought her on for a few years which led to five years of being a Blues Disciple. "Then," explains Erica, "I felt like I was sort of stuck in this same kind of music ... I can do a whole blues set, but there's always a few people in that audience that are not blues lovers. So, you gotta mix it up.

In the beginning was The Blues.

make people happy ... Let's switch it up! Let's have some fun!"

The Mighty Ms. Erica and The Sound Production is that band. Backed by four super-skillful musicians, Erica is playing a mix of blues, soul and r&b in venues from clubs to Locust Street Festival to Summerfest to the Harley Homecoming. A little Clean Up Woman. A little Gladys Knight. "I do a lot of Tina Turner ... It's kind of been like my thing. At the end everybody's waiting for me to do Proud Mary," she says. "I always end my show with it."

You need to see this dynamo in action on stage! But before you go, get your hair done by her. Because, yes, this is only one part of Ms. Erica. She's also a business owner. Close to twenty years back, she took her Cosmetology License and opened a salon in Wauwatosa on 68th and North.

When she needed to move her shop, she found a spot in Riverwest that had been a garage space. The architect's design ended in it being a near replica of her first shop. The cozy, chic salon, London's Healthy Hair, has been at 610 East Clarke St. for nine years now.

By appointment only, Erica and her daughter, Rashon, are the two stylists. Rashon, who is twenty-seven, has been helping out at the London since she was fourteen. She apprenticed under Erica for Cosmetology and got her Instructor's License, like

her mother. Erica has also been teaching Hair in the Cosmetology department at MATC for the last four years.

A multi-faceted achiever, Erica Johnson also holds Bachelors Degrees in Criminal Justice and Education. She is planning



Jackie Robinson, My Grandmother and Me

Recently,(in 2007) news headlines commemorated Jackie Robinson's 60th anniversary of breaking the racial barrier in major league baseball. To America generally, Jackie Robinson's legend was not only being the first Negro to integrate major league sports but also of being one of the greatest baseball players ever.

To Negroes at that time, Jackie Robinson was very special our own national hero, our own colored champion. We, descendants of slaves, were called Negroes or Coloreds then, Black later, and African Americans today.

Life was hard for Negroes in racist America with few reasons to celebrate our own people. Our last heroes were World War II era champions; Jesse Owens of the University of Illinois who won Olympic gold medals in track in front of Adolph Hitler; and Joe Louis, the Brown Bomber, who won the World Heavy Weight Boxing Title from the German, Max Schmeling making them America's heroes too.

After World War II, baseball was America's game. It was played in every community in our country, and the ve oes had been denied. My essay won and then Alderwoman Vel Phillips presented me the award as my grandmother lovingly watched.

My grandmother loved Jackie

Robinson. He meant so much to Negroes, not only as one of the best players in previously segregated major league baseball, but also as a national role model. He was a four-year letterman at UCLA and an Army Lieutenant in World War II. He was mild mannered, humble, and showed exemplary behavior while playing in Canada for Montreal before coming home to America and playing for the Brooklyn Dodgers.

We all read about his achievements in the sports sections of the daily newspapers across the country. Negroes followed Jackie Robinson in the colorful pages of our Ebony and Jet magazines that we bought at the news stand on 3rd and Wisconsin Ave.

Many Negroes like my grandmother, who previously had no interest in baseball, now listened on the radio and flocked to see Jackie Robinson and the Dodgers when they came to their local major league ballpark. It felt so good to cheer for and celebrate your champion, another Negro.

Jackie Robinson not only brought a good glove and bat to America's game, but he took base running to a new dimension with his speed and cunning, becoming "King of the Base Paths." Jackie Robinson, the first Negro in major league baseball, became its "Most Valuable Player," and won hearts all across America.

My grandmother grew up listening to the radio for entertainment, especially programs from Radio City Music Hall in New York City. When possible, Odessa would tune the radio to Dodger's games to cheer Jackie, often while she was on her knees scrubbing someone else's floors for minimal pay.

My grandmother loved me and wanted me to see one of the most important people in her lifetime. I'll never forget the day that she took me to see Jackie Robinson and the Brooklyn Dodgers play the Cubs at Wrigley Field in Chicago.

On a cool, cloudy summer morning, we left my house on East Garfield and took the Holton Street bus downtown to the Greyhound Station, then at 2nd and Michigan Streets. As a first grader at Palmer Street School, I was so excited about the trip to Chicago. My grandmother bought me chocolate milk, which I remember was so cold that it made me shiver on the three-hour bus ride.

It was a beautiful summer day by the time we got to Wrigley Field. We were both astounded by the biggest building and the most people that we had ever seen. I held my grandmother's hand tightly as we moved through the crowd trying to find our seats.

It was also the first time my grandmother had been to a major league baseball game. Negroes didn't really go to these games until Jackie Robinson played, and now we were here, my grandmother and me.

Stadium ushers directed us around the huge building and down a short tunnel. > we could see Jackie Robinson. The usher then bowed to her and proceeded to lead us to the first row, behind home plate on the first base side, to our two seats, the best seats in the ballpark.

> Looking back, I would have expected that our tickets would have been for seats in the bleachers because of the cost. I often wonder how long my grandmother scrubbed floors to pay for those tickets. My grandmother loved Jackie Robinson and me.

> We watched batting practice and when Jackie Robinson approached the batter's box, the fans gave him a thunderous applause. Watching him practice, I studied him swing his bat level, roll his wrists, make contact with the ball, follow through level and maintain good balance. Later, I was inspired to imitate his technique as I played ball as a kid at the Boy's Club near 15th and Center Streets and as an East Town Bat at Kern Park on Humboldt and Keefe Avenue.

> During the game, I remember seeing Jackie hit the ball and immediately blur past us with unbelievable speed to first base. As the Cubs pitched to the next Dodger batter, all of a sudden Jackie rocketed down the base path and stole second base.

> Everyone in Wrigley Field, including Cubs and Dodgers fans, and Negroes across the country listening to their radios, gave him a standing ovation. My Grandmother Odessa and I were there behind home plate cheering our champion and looking at him standing tall on second base with a humble smile on his face.



As we stood awestruck, a nearby usher asked us if we were in the right section, implying that we couldn't afford to be there. This upset my Grandmother Odessa and she grabbed my hand, nervously shaking. She gave him our tickets and with a quivering voice told him politely but very firmly that she had paid for the best seats so that

Barnacle Bud's

1955 S. Hilbert St. 414-481-9974 Hours: Open daily, 11am-9pm <u>barnaclebuds.com</u>

When you want a taste of the nautical life, pay a visit to Barnacle Bud's. The setting falls somewhere in between a Florida dive bar and what you find at a Wisconsin lake resort where the smell of the water mingles with the sounds of boats docking. At Barnacle Bud's it doesn't get much better than a frosty Blue Moon with a slice of orange served at a picnic table on the deck while you watch the sunset outline the skyline across the river.

Your GPS can direct you to this Kinnickinnic River riverside paradise, but if you tend to be directionally challenged, you might appreciate this short tutorial. At the north end of Kinnickinic Avenue in Bay View, turn east on to E. Bay Street and then turn left on Hilbert Street. When Hilbert becomes a bumpy mess that's more like a dead-end alley than a street to somewhere, keep going. You will eventually arrive. Because Barnacle Bud's shares a parking area with Skipper Bud's, mind the signs. If you don't have a permit, you could be towed. The threat is real. And here are two more housekeeping details; Barnacle Bud's does not accept reservations; your dog is not welcome at the table.

Since 1992, Barnacle Bud (McKiernan) and his wife Victoria have dished up seafood in sandwiches and baskets. As a longtime customer, I can give the grouper a rave whether it is served in the Traditional Fish Fry, in a Po Boy Sandwich with spicy mayo, in a Build your Own Sandwich, or combined with coleslaw and Swiss in a Grouper Reuben. Over the years I've opted for the Grouper Fish Fry. Nothing has changed except the price. The grouper has a light, crisp, tempura-like batter that keeps the fish moist and retains its mild flavor.

At a recent lunch, while I raved about the deliciousness of my grouper, my companion had a like experience with the catfish and its cornmeal crust. Both dishes came with fries, rye bread, and mild creamy slaw, classic components of a fish fry.

We noted the walkway to the back section of the restaurant where you can sit under the shade of a roof. With no

guardrail to prevent an unexpected dive into the river, this passage could be a challenge after a few Blue Moon brews. You won't run out of choices on the extensive menu. You can get a Big Dog with onions and relish, Gene's Big Boy Burger, the Classic, with lettuce, tomato, American cheese and 1000 Island sauce, Cajun Crawfish Tails over rice with spicy garlic butter, Jambalaya over rice with chicken or shrimp, or, a Lobster Roll, with or without the roll. You will also find a Surf and Turf on the menu, a delicious combination of a perfectly charred medium steak topped with four



plump grilled shrimp, along with baby potatoes, garlic bread, and salad. There was enough on the plate for a share because my companions also ordered Clam Chowder, only available on Fridays. It was thick, full of clams, and included bits of celery for extra flavor and crunch. It also had enough heat to wake up your mouth and to keep it interesting.

From Appetizers, my friend and I shared two Crab Cakes. They were served with coleslaw and spicy remoulade sauce, a classic complement that enhanced the flavors in the crab cakes.

If I had to pick a favorite from many meals at Barnacle Bud's, it would be the Po Boy Shrimp Sandwich. This one is for shrimp lovers. The chef overflows the bun with more than a dozen juicy shrimp coated with spicy mayonnaise. A side of sliced jalapeno adds more fire if you are up to it. For the Grouper Po Boy, the fish is grilled, an equally tasty sandwich if grouper is your choice.

In addition to the wine and beer selection, there's a Moscow Mule with vodka and ginger beer; the Dark and Stormy, ginger beer and rum; and Victoria's Cooler with pear vodka, cranberry juice and lemonade. If I order something especially spicy at lunch, the non-alcoholic, sweet, tart lemonade is my drink of choice.

If you want dessert, order the Key Lime Pie. It's sweet, tart, and covered with whipped cream. It tastes as good as it looks.

I return often to Barnacle Bud's because it is a place where I can anticipate a cold one, good food, attentive friendly servers, and a front row seat to a memorable sunset.

There is still some commercial shipping on the Kinikinnic River. If your lucky you will see a ship from St. Mary's Cement crusing down the river.

"As long as people are making art and collaborating, I'm happy," said Steve Sorrentino in describing his role in helping produce this month's Steamroller MKE event. Steve is head of Thunderbird Creative, a brand development and integrated marketing firm. He studied fine art and printmaking at M.I.A.D. before he did a stint in the corporate world and eventually merged his interests and experiences to create innovative, community-building projects to further the arts and help small business folks. Sorrentino teamed up with House of R.A.D.'s Brandon Minga to get Steamroller, uh ... rolling. (R.A.D. stands for resident, artist, doer.) House of R.A.D. is home to over 50 artist studio spaces and to AP3, Anchor Press, Paper & Print, a non-profit, community-based print shop. Steamroller MKE is a fundraiser for AP3 and promises to turn folks on to the coolness of all different types of printmaking and even paper making.

Brandon Minga, House of R.A.D.'s founder (along with Tim Priebe), is a longtime doer of awesome stuff and maker of awesome art. He's also a M.I.A.D. alum, and works in branding, identity, interiors, murals, live painting, video, commercial art, and sculpture.

For the Steamroller MKE fundraiser, more than 20 local and regional artists are creating original woodcut blocks that will be used to make large scale prints on paper or fabric. A rented steam roller will serve as the printing press. An original piece from each of the artists will be auctioned off, the proceeds going to help support Anchor Press, Paper & Print (AP3).

Sustainable Style: My Search for Sustainable Fashion in Milwaukee

Which the social consciousness of sustainability on the rise, many fashion brands are changing the ways in which they produce and distribute their clothing. Consumers are also growing more concerned with the ethics behind their clothing choices, and many are making a commitment to shop sustainably. I set out on a quest to find stores in Milwaukee that are making a commitment to sustainability. This fashion show will consist solely of pre-owned and upcycled clothing, with looks put together by community members. If community members wish to style outfits for the fashion show, they must make a commitment to only use repurposed clothing. Shawnette Smart, one of the directors of forMartha, wanted to create a fun and inclusive event while simultaneously promoting the sustainability movement. Smart believes that it is our responsibility to take the steps that we can to reverse the grave jeopardy that our planet is in. Smart believes that no step is too small, she shared "the choices we make

able to combat this by using mannequins that represent different body types that will be dressed and posed on a runway for the show. Smart hopes to find enough models for the upcoming fashion shows and is encouraging Riverwest community members to apply. In addition to the fashion show, forMartha hosts a recurring pop-up shop in their event space. This pop-up shop consists of repurposed, upcycled, and vintage clothing for people of all shapes and sizes. Smart shared that the main goal with the pop-up shop is to "Help people to uplift their own self image through their unique expression. We get a lot of that here, when people shop here it's almost like they're playing dress up... I find it really exciting to be part of a movement that allows people to be their best selves." Boutique 801 is another store committed to sustainable practices in Riverwest, holds a collection of both second hand and vintage items. The store owner, Anita Terrell, collected pre-owned and vintage clothing all her life and always had a goal of opening her own store. Terrell explained that "I'm a shopaholic, I have a lot of clothing, jewelry, and accessories to share." Terrell originally collected clothing items for donation, but eventually decided to open a store back in August of 2018. She decided to open her store in Riverwest because of the community and popularity of the area.

Bandit MKE

Is located at 1224 E Brady Street, Hours Closed Mon., Tue to Sun. Noon to 8pm.

Bandit MKE sells vintage clothing dating back to as early as the 1940s, but takes much of their inspiration from both the 80s and 90s. Owners Michelle Eigenberger and Liz Kiesling were both long-time collectors

All of the inventory in her store is sustainably sourced. Terrell doesn't search for specific pieces, she looks for clothing that's in good condition and doesn't really follow a specific aesthetic when curating her collection. Terrell also doesn't exclusively look for vintage items, she sells clothes from all time periods, making her store a place where anyone can find something that they like, regardless of their personal style. Whatever she finds that isn't in a good enough condition to resell gets up-cycled and made into a new piece. When asked whether or not she believes that fashion is a form of artistic expression, Terrell replied "Yes! That's the reason why I love Riverwest, you see lots of artistic expression and flair in this area. That's what makes it a great place to be!"

to make selling vintage clothing their full time jobs back in the summer of 2020. Eigenberger and Kiesling decided to combine their collections and sell vintage clothing out of their backyard during the start of the pandemic. Their store began as a monthly pop-up shop but they decided to open a permanent location when they found a space on Brady Street. This was where many of their original customers from the pop-up shop were located. The space used to be a radio station, but they were able to renovate it and turn it into a vintage store with Kiesling doing much of the interior design herself.

Now Eigenberger and Kiesling are selling vintage clothing both in store and on their online storefront. They collect clothing from estate sales and flea markets, but

a large portion of their collection is bought, sold, and traded from the community. Eigenberger shared that, "our goal is to stay away from fast fashion and preserve garments that have traveled throughout time... The store helps to connect the community through clothing." Therefore, their collection consists mainly of vintage clothing with many unique pieces that have been collected by community members over the years. When curating their collection, Eigenberger and Kiesling keep their customers in mind, stocking their storewith items that their customers have expressed interest in, as well as eras in fashion that speak to them the most. No matter what your personal style is, or what time period in fashion speaks to you the most, Bandit MKE has something for you.

Is a vintage clothing store that caters to those who wish to find items ranging from the late 80s to the early 2000s. The owner, Benny Tralongo, started his career reselling a variety of different items when he was just ten years old. Motivated by a desire to start his own brand, Tralongo created an original clothing line in 2015. Tralongo started selling his original pieces and in 2017 he later integrated vintage clothing into his collection. In 2020, Tralongo officially opened his store right before the start of the pandemic. When curating his collection, Tralongo draws inspiration from his childhood. He searches for items inspired by his childhood interests, for example old cartoons, comic books, sport teams, anime, video games, and many more. He also searches for items inspired by both graffiti culture and skating culture. Tralongo shared that he doesn't usually look for big labels or brands, he aims to stay true to what he grew up with. Tralongo stated, "If you want to step into a place that feels nostalgic, this is the place... I like when

people come in and feel connected to the collection. I wish I had a store like this when I was a kid." When asked about the way in which his store makes a commitment to sustainability, Tralongo explained that all of the inventory is vintage and pre owned, except for the clothing in the SayWerd original line. However, he often looks for blank vintage or pre owned items and up-cycles them with the SayWerd logo to be sold in the store. Each year Tralongo creates a couple of SayWerd original collections, but most of the vintage collection is sourced on online auctions or bought, sold, and traded directly from the community. Additionally, Tralongo runs a clothing drive each year in December that is largely dependent on donations. He aims to make his store and his collection accessible to people of all backgrounds. When asked whether or not he believes that fashion is a form of artistic expression, Tralongo replied "one hundred percent, yes! It's one of the most responsive and relative forms of artistic

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
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
